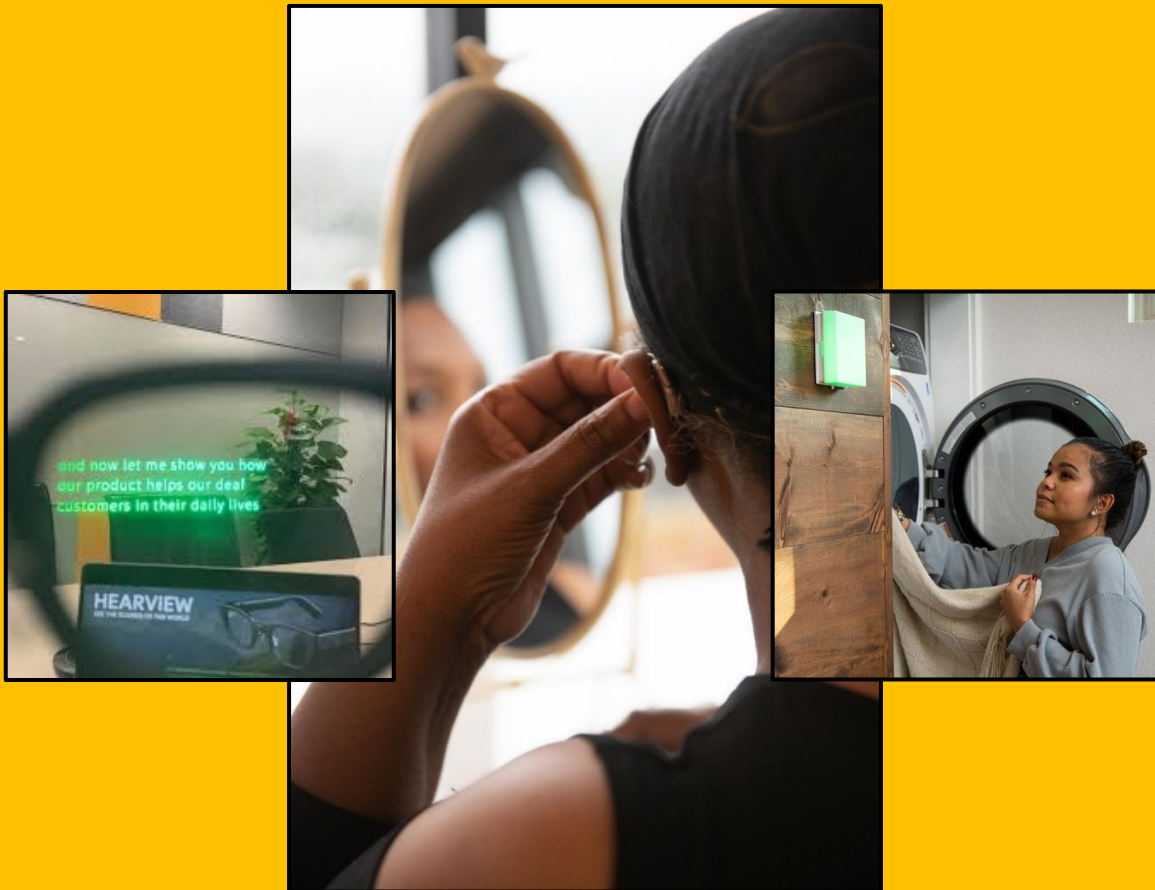

DEFINING HEARING AIDS, HEARING ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY, ASSISTIVE LISTENING DEVICES, AND ASSISTIVE LISTENING SYSTEMS



Over the Counter (OTC) Hearing Aids are available in Maryland, without a prescription, for anyone over the age of 18 with mild to moderate hearing loss. Ideally, an individual will receive a hearing test from an audiologist to determine their level of hearing loss so they will know if they are a good candidate for this type of hearing aid.

Remember, your OTC hearing aid should fit well and feel comfortable!



Prescription Hearing Aids are recommended by audiologists after an audiology exam, and are often intended for severe hearing loss and anyone under the age of 18. Audiologists can also prescribe hearing aids for mild to moderate hearing loss, customized to each person's level of hearing loss.

Remember, a good hearing aid will separate voices from background noise, modulate volume, and clarify speech, and is customized to each person's level of hearing loss.

***Hearing Assistive Technology (HAT)** includes a variety of devices, tools, software and equipment that can help you better understand speech, music and other sounds, so you can more fully participate in different areas of life.

Some HAT is used with hearing aids or cochlear implants, while others support anyone who wants assistance with receiving sound, including those with mild hearing loss. The HAT that will be most useful to you depends on your hearing loss and where you require communication access, whether at work, school, home, place of business or public venue. HATs help with activities of daily living/supplement to ALDs.

***Assistive Listening Devices (ALD)** can help individuals with hearing loss communicate in one-to-one conversations by enhancing sound so you can understand more easily, especially in places with background noise. Examples of ALD include remote microphones, which can stream a speaker's voice directly into hearing devices, and one-

on-one personal amplifiers, which increase sound volume in face-to-face conversations or in small groups.

Assistive Listening Systems (ALS) are complete systems or setups designed to improve hearing in specific environments. An ALS typically includes both transmitting components (like microphones or sound sources) and receiving components (like devices or hearing aids). ALS help with public accessibility.

HEARING IMPAIRMENT STATISTICS



- Hearing loss is twice as common as diabetes or cancer.
- About 80% of hearing losses can be treated with hearing aids, but only 1 in 4 use them.
- Hearing aid use helps offset cognitive decline (5x greater risk with untreated hearing loss).
- 18% of those with hearing loss have depression, compared with 8% of those with normal hearing; depression improves with hearing aid use.
- The risk of falling triples with untreated hearing loss.
- About 28% of adults over 52 with hearing loss experience difficulty with daily activities, compared with 7.3% with normal hearing.
- 1 in 8 people in the United States ages 12+ have hearing loss.
- Untreated hearing loss correlated with up to \$30,000 less salary. Labor statistics showed an unemployment rate of 27% of those with normal hearing, but 44% of those with hearing loss.

FUNDING FOR HEARING AIDS AND HEARING ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

For those who qualify, financing opportunities may be available to finance all or a portion of a hearing aid or hearing assistive technology.

HEALTH INSURANCE

HB1339: Health Insurance - Hearing Aids for Adults - Coverage

This bill requires insurers, nonprofit health service plans, and health maintenance organizations (collectively known as carriers) to provide coverage for all medically appropriate and necessary hearing aids for an adult covered under a policy or contract if the hearing aids are prescribed, fitted, and dispensed by a licensed audiologist. Carriers may limit the benefit to \$1,400 per hearing aid for each hearing-impaired ear every 36 months. An insured or enrollee may choose a hearing aid that is priced higher than the benefit limit and pay the difference in cost without financial or contractual penalty to the hearing aid provider. The bill does not prohibit carriers from providing coverage that is greater or more favorable. The bill takes effect January 1, 2025, and applies to all policies, contracts, and health benefit plans issued, delivered, or renewed in the State of Maryland on or after that date.

MEDICAID

Maryland Medicaid may provide coverage for hearing aids, cochlear implants, and other audiological services for eligible residents. To find out more about eligibility criteria, covered services, service limitations and more, visit [Welcome to Maryland Medicaid](#).

CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM (CHIP)

CHIP (Children's Health Insurance Program) in Maryland, which is part of the Maryland Medicaid program for children, does cover hearing aids for eligible children. CHIP provides comprehensive coverage for children who are under 19 and meet the income eligibility requirements, and it includes a wide range of health services, such as hearing aids.



Key Details About CHIP Coverage for Hearing Aids in Maryland:

1. Eligibility for CHIP:

CHIP is designed for children under the age of 19 whose family income is too high to qualify for Medicaid but too low to afford private health insurance. Coverage is available to children regardless of their immigration status. If a child qualifies for CHIP, they can receive essential health services, including hearing aids. If your child is eligible, CHIP typically covers all or most of the costs for hearing aids, meaning little or no out-of-pocket expense for families.

2. What CHIP Covers for Hearing Loss:

- Hearing Aids: CHIP covers the full cost of hearing aids if they are deemed medically necessary. This includes both the purchase and fitting of hearing aids.
- Hearing Evaluations: CHIP also covers hearing tests and audiological evaluations to assess the need for hearing aids.
- Follow-up Care: Coverage typically extends to follow-up visits, including maintenance and adjustments to hearing aids, to ensure proper fit and function.

3. Requirements:

To obtain hearing aids through CHIP, a healthcare provider (such as an audiologist or pediatrician) must conduct a hearing evaluation and determine that hearing aids are medically necessary.

A referral or prescription from the child's primary care provider (PCP) may be required for the hearing aids to be covered under CHIP.

4. How to Apply:

Families interested in CHIP should apply through Maryland Health Connection, the state's health insurance marketplace. You can apply online, by phone, or in person at a local health department or through community partners.

MARYLAND FUNDING RESOURCES

Gateway Maryland *(Formerly known as The Hearing and Speech Agency)*

Gateway provides hearing aids offered at very reasonable prices. The styles of hearing aids include behind-the-ear (BTE), in-the-ear (ITE), and in-the-canal (CIC). The latest technology in hearing aids, programmable and digital, are also available at Gateway. Hear Now works directly with hearing aid manufacturers and provides hearing aids, for a modest fee, to individuals with extremely limited income. Gateway's audiology services are provided to Hear Now clients at reduced rates. Other audiological services offered are comprehensive hearing testing, Hearing aid evaluation and selection, fitting of custom earmolds, hearing protectors and swim plugs, simple hearing aid repairs, and Hearing aid batteries and accessories.

Maryland Assistive Technology Financial Loan Program

The Assistive Technology Financial Loan Program helps Maryland residents with disabilities and their families qualify for low-interest loans to buy equipment that will help them live, work, and learn more independently. The program offers flexible lending criteria including lower income thresholds, longer repayment terms, and loan guarantees for those who qualify.

CENTERS FOR INDEPENDENT LIVING

Designed and operated by individuals with disabilities, Centers for Independent Living (CILs) provide independent living services for people with disabilities. These programs provide tools, resources, and support for integrating people with disabilities fully into their communities to promote equal opportunities, self-determination, and respect.

Maryland houses 7 CILs, each serving different counties of the state. Each CIL offers a matching-grant program, covering 70-80% of the cost of an approved home/vehicle modification or assistive device, up to between \$5,000 and \$8,500, depending on the CIL. This funding can be used to help finance hearing aids and hearing AT.

Travelers Protective Association of America established the TPA Scholarship Trust for the Deaf and Near Deaf in 1975 to provide financial aid to children and adults who suffer deafness or hearing impairment and who need assistance in buying devices, medical or specialized treatment or specialized education, speech classes, note takers, interpreters and other services for the hearing impaired. Completed applications must be returned to the Trust by the end of each quarter: March 31st, June 30th, September 30th, and December 31st. Recipients may only receive aid once a year by completing a new application each time they seek assistance. United Health Care Children's Foundation will cover up to \$5,000 annually in uncovered medical expenses related to hearing loss for individuals with private insurance (not public insurance). Fire and Burn Safety Coalition of Maryland (FABSCOM)

FABSCOM provides assistance to Maryland residents with a qualified need, helping them obtain a home alarm system equipped with both visual and sensory alerts to notify them if their smoke or carbon monoxide alarms are activated. To request this assistance and participate in the program, applicants must complete all required questions, certify that they are deaf or hard of hearing and submit the application. Please note that applicants residing in institutional facilities, such as dormitories, nursing homes, or assisted living centers, are not eligible for FABSCOM assistance.

Maryland Division of Rehabilitation Services (DORS)

State vocational rehabilitation program that provides services to people with disabilities who want to work or keep their current employment. Programs and services for eligible individuals may include vocational evaluation, skills training, academic preparation and job placement assistance. People who are hard of hearing and trying to secure or retain employment may be eligible for hearing aids, assistive devices, interpreter services and more.

The Maryland Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (MD EHDI) program aims to ensure that every baby born in Maryland receives the newborn hearing screening and that hearing status is identified at the earliest age possible, preferably by 3 months of age. The MD EHDI Program coordinates with providers statewide to help ensure that babies who are identified as deaf or hard of hearing receive early intervention services, preferably by 6 months of age.

LOAN BANKS AND LENDING LIBRARIES

Maryland offers a variety of programs that provide no-cost, short-term lending of hearing aids and assistive listening technologies, ensuring individuals have access to the tools they need to hear more clearly while navigating long-term solutions.

MDTAP hosts 9 lending libraries across the state with hearing assistive technologies available, demonstration & consultation services, AT training, and a hightech AT reuse program. This service does not provide access to hearing aids.

Anne Arundel County Assistive Technology Loan Program

The Americans With Disabilities (ADA) Office maintains a collection of assistive technology that is available for loan or demonstration for Anne Arundel County employees, residents, their families, professionals, and educators who work with individuals with disabilities. Participants can borrow assistive technology equipment for a maximum of 3 weeks or schedule a product demonstration with ADA staff free of charge. Staff will provide individuals with the opportunity to borrow and use the equipment to see if it meets the needs of the individual. Staff is also able to assist with locating resources to help individuals purchase assistive technology equipment. There is no cost to see or borrow devices.

HEARING AID MANUFACTURER CONSUMER SUPPORT INFORMATION

COMPARING HEARING AID FEATURES

There are many kinds of hearing aids, each comprising different features, such as Telecoil, Bluetooth and FM capabilities. Audiologists usually only work with a few different brands of hearing aids, so it can be wise to research what you want out of your hearing aids and identify a specific brand prior to scheduling your audiology appointment. Resources like www.hearingtracker.com can help you to learn about what's available and compare features.

FINDING COMPATIBLE DEVICES

To find the compatible Personal Mics or Table Mics for a specific model or serial number of hearing aids, you would need to provide the make and model of your hearing aids. Each hearing aid brand has different systems for wireless accessories, and compatibility

can depend on whether the hearing aids are Bluetooth-enabled or use other wireless technologies like FM or telecoil systems.

Once you provide the details of your hearing aids, here's the typical process you can follow to find compatible microphones and local dispensers:

1. Identify Your Hearing Aid Model and Serial Number:

You can find your hearing aid's model and serial number in the following places:

- On the packaging or receipt if you have it.
- On the hearing aid itself (usually under the battery door or in the battery compartment).
- On any paperwork or manuals that came with your hearing aids.

2. Check the Manufacturer's Website:

- Once you know the make and model of your hearing aids, visit the manufacturer's website (e.g., Phonak, Oticon, ReSound, Siemens, Widex, etc.).
- Manufacturers typically list compatible accessories like personal microphones (e.g., Roger Mics for Phonak or ConnectClip for Oticon).
- You can also access the user manual for information about compatible wireless devices and systems.

3. Consult a Hearing Healthcare Provider or Audiologist:

- If you don't have access to the specific model number or need assistance determining compatibility, contact your local hearing aid provider or audiologist.
- An audiologist or dispenser can help you find the correct accessories and ensure compatibility with your hearing aids.

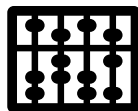
